September Guest Artist Joseph Zbukvic

Internationally Acclaimed Joseph Zbukvic is our September Guest Artist. Joseph was born in Croatia and now lives in Melbourne, Australia. He began his painting career in 1978 and quickly became one of Australia's finest artists. Born in Zagreb, Croatia, Joseph immigrated to Australia when he was eighteen to go to art school to study industrial design, as cars were a particular passion of his. He started using watercolor to render images for his designs and fell in love with the medium, without any watercolor training. Although he did graduate with a degree in industrial design, he chose to continue in watercolor, and he quickly started achieving recognition and success as a watercolor artist. When he sold a painting that earned him more than his father back in Croatia made, he decided to go forward with painting as his career.

Since then, he has won over 200 international awards with over 40 solo exhibitions, most recently with a major solo show in Shanghai, for which he created over 40 stunning paintings. This gallery is internationally recognized for showcasing some of the best watercolor artists from China and around the world.

This self-taught painter is widely considered one of the finest in the world. CWA is very lucky to have him, and we thank our member David Savellano for helping to bring him here. This is his first trip to the Bay Area, and we hope that he will fall in love with our beautiful community and come back again!

His achievements and success is due to his ability to transform any subject into visual poetic language. Covering a huge variety of subjects, his sensitive, lyrical and atmospheric paintings have captured people and galleries from all around the world. Joseph believes that each painting must tell a story; otherwise it is just a picture.

When he is working in the studio on a larger piece from a photo, he will edit the image to help it tell the story he wants to tell, such as adding movement lines or shadows. Before he begins to paint, he sees the painting in his mind's eye, which is critical, so he knows where he is going in the work. Also very important to him is working to let the water flow and the painting "paint itself" in certain areas,

then scratching to add highlights or using his fingers to pull out color, then floating a mist over the area to freshen the work. And then adding color right out of the tube to sharpen other areas. continued on page 2

As *Watercolour Journey* says, Joseph has an absolute passion for watercolor, but with his exceptional drawing skills and extraordinary artistic abilities, he is proficient in any medium. It is this passion for watercolors that has led him to become a unique master of that medium. Although greatly admired for his soft moody impressions of rural life, Joseph also produces strong urban scenes and powerful equestrian images. He has always had a deep connection and affection for the laborer and the common man and it is these works that are also his finest paintings ever produced in watercolor. One of his DVDs is of working people done plein air.

Joseph has continued to explore new subjects and fresh ways to express his vision by frequent overseas travel; he also spent 3 years living in the south of France. He has reached a new level of technical ability, maturity and strength as he enters the fourth decade of his career.

Joseph's website gives us a glimpse inside his studio, and although most of his works are painted plein air, he tells us that his studio provides him with an important creative environment filled with reference and materials for his larger scale paintings. There is a wonderful video on YouTube showing Joseph being interviewed for Australian TV and going through a painting session, which illustrates some of the techniques previously mentioned.

All of my treasures have a story to tell and looking at them can often lead me on a journey resulting in the choice of my next painting subject.

Joseph's studio is a converted warehouse with abundance of natural light and an amazing collection of memorabilia discovered through his numerous travels.

I try to achieve a balance of harmony between tonal values, design, color and mood that will visually evoke the emotions between the viewer and the painting.

Joseph has published two books and has released several painting classes on DVD with APV Films. With them, he has done a series of instructional and informative videos. In each video, Joseph invites us on his adventure as he captures the essence of the scene, explaining thoroughly his amazing watercolor techniques. Joseph's latest watercolor by APV called 'People At Work' is now available at art shops or from APV. He has a special line of brushes from the Spanish company, Escoda, popular with many artists. He uses Daniel Smith watercolors, as well as Schminke.



from the president CWA 46th National = San Francisco Adventure

Yes, there is more adventure connected to a national watercolor show than you can shake a paintbrush at, especially if it is in a destination city like San Francisco!

We started on our latest National scouting expedition August 13th. My husband and I caught BART at Pleasant Hill and disembarked at the Embarcadero station. From the BART station we walked towards the Ferry Building. Just in front of the Ferry Building is the 'F-Line' bus stop. There we caught the 'F.' The 'F' travels down the Embarcadero, which becomes Jefferson Street. You will stay on the 'F' until the end of the line at Jones and Beach.

We walked a short distance down Jefferson St. to 2801 Leavenworth St. We saw the familiar sandwich board directing us to the Cannery Galleries. Instead of touring the gallery, we investigated public parking in the area. Our National chairperson, Ruth Miller, gave me this assignment when I told her we were checking out a different route to the Academy of Art University, San Francisco (AAUSF).



There is quite a bit of parking right near the gallery. Anchorage Square shopping center is located right across the street. Jefferson, Beach, Jones and Leavenworth Streets border it. The two entrances to the parking garage are located on Beach Street between Leavenworth and Jones. I will just say the prices took my breath away! There are a number of fee-based parking lots in the area. (I checked a parking app on my iPhone called ParkMe Parking by ParkMe, Inc. available for free at the App Store.)

By this time we were thirsty, so we stopped at the Winery Collective for wine tasting. We were happy to find that most of the wines are from Treasure Island wineries! The collective is right next to the Argonaut Hotel.

After a relaxing time wine tasting, we really needed some lunch, so this time we walked only a few steps more to the patio at the Blue Mermaid Chowder House & Bar. Wonderful patio, very good food and friendly servers - a great day in San Francisco.

After lunch we strolled a few steps to the AAUSF galleries. Three new artists were showing their work, two photographers and a painter. Of course the work triggered new ideas in my mind!

It was time to go home, so we walked over to Jones and Beach to catch the 'F' back to the Ferry Building. Yes, it is the same stop you got off at! That is how easy it is. The 'F' can be crowded, but there are always more 'F's on the way, often just a minute or two behind so don't be discouraged. Just consider what a wonderful adventure you just had! Cheers!




Beaux Arts Berries by Diane Fujimoto

I asked some of the painters entering the Risky Business show what risks or new approaches they were taking with their entries. The answers ranged from technical experimentation to experiencing the aesthetics of paint.

Painter (and CWA president) Carol Husslein explained, "I attended the 2011 CWA Cheng-Khee Chee workshop. One of the processes Cheng-Khee introduced to us used illustration board as the substrate instead of regular watercolor paper. You use acrylic gel medium to draw your subject, in my case a three painting series of Mendocino landscapes. I did not "draw" the land masses with a pencil, I drew them with a pallet knife dipped in gel. After letting the gel dry for a few days, it was pretty thick in areas, I started dropping in my watercolors. I used very rich colors. The gel allowed me to manipulate the paint easily."

Craig Moline painted a large landscape of the serene view from his home in Benicia. Craig used Frisket for the first time to block out sections of cloud. Craig used multiple views from three photographs to paint a second landscape.

Both Craig and Carol tried something new and risky in a painting technique. Joan Alexander tried working with color and water flowing across the paper. Joan told me, " (I) guess the risky part was looking at a blank piece of paper, wetting it and just putting down some color. I know that yellow will explode so I just kept putting down color and seeing what it would do.."

I asked the artists how they reflected on or made sense of their experience with a new painting practice. Carol Husslein explained, "First of all, as I'm sure many of us can identify with, I had a lot of workshop materials on hand that I had never used before. After that workshop, I stored those materials away. You know the saying "out of sight out of mind" well that is what happened to me. When I heard about the "risky business" show I decided to unearth that illustration board and do something with it."

Changing process can change outcomes. Carol continued, "I loved the process. Taking it even further, I did NOT mat the paintings. I used spacers and framed without a mat. This was something very different for me."



A focus on the aesthetics of paint. Joan Alexander commented, "Actually, both paintings were done the same way - first - nothing in mind, just how the color would react to the wet paper. I think this is the best way to create and plan to do more paintings this way. It is hard to settle down enough to make something of only wet paper and wet paint, but I do like a challenge! Of course I always consider color and composition - but I love to watch how different colors react on wet paper.

Joan Alexander: Strange Horizon-watercolor

Painting is a risk. Craig Moline said, "I would say every painting is a "risky business." I am convinced (lazy) that practice, practice, practice is the key to a better artist.

My final question for the Risky Business artists was: What new practices might you take forward to your next paintings?

Stretching. Craig described stretching as an artist, when he commented on the need for "pushing yourself and choosing different subjects matters; even though you feel uncommitted in the beginning you feel proud to complete."

Planning. Carol told me, "I'm already planning a set of 4 paintings using the materials I used for my risky business paintings in another way. I'm excited about my new ideas and that is a good thing! If what you are doing is not exciting, why do it?" Carol's final comment was, "I'm glad to have this opportunity to show something different!"

Stepping beyond the aesthetics of color. Joan: I am trying something new since I entered the show. I have started to block off 18 squares on a half sheet, then, paint a partial image that involves very little realism. I did some small images of sheep, 18 of them, while trying for soft edges rather than hard edges. I find the color does not really make a difference. I am concentrating on the edges, whether hard or soft.

As I write my column for September, I remember Skip Lawrence explaining that learning to paint is really about learning who you are. He asked, "If all we know of you is your work, would we know you." Lawrence believes the key to good painting is honest expression, which sounds easy, but in my personal experience is not. Sharing insights with other painters confirms my hunch that painting is risky business in general. I want to thank the three painters who were willing to talk with me about the risks they took in their work. I will talk to some other risk takers for the next column. As always, dear reader, I love to hear from you and hear what you think. Thanks in advance for any thoughts you might share with me.
