Cezanne after painting with Pissarro, changed his style forever. Last but not least, Picasso viewing Cezanne's work. Picasso developed cubism from Cezanne's style and never looked back.

So, as we move into our 50th National Exhibition season I say to you...

Lead your own art and let others follow you!
