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
March Guest Artist Bev Jozwiak



Our guest artist for March and our workshop artist for March is CWA Member Bev Jozwiak, who will be giving a workshop entitled *Painting Life with Life*, March 16-18.

Jozwiak comes from a family of artists, and has always been involved in art. In her 30's, she really got serious about art, graduating with Honors and a Fine Arts degree (plus an art history minor). Alas, Bev did not know what to do with it, and so she took a job to pay the bills. An early midlife crisis prompted Jozwiak to recognize that she had always wanted to be an artist. Bev started entering local shows, and the rest is history. Born in Vancouver, Washington, Bev still resides there with her husband of 30 plus years.

Per Bev, art is her joy and her job. Jozwiak is a signature member of The American Watercolor Society, the National Watercolor Society, Watercolor West and NWWWS. She has had a plethora of magazine articles in everything from The Artist, Watercolor, American Art collector, to International Artist Magazine, and more. She is the author of a 164-page technique/coffee table book called *Painting Life with Life* - life as in people and animals and life as in energy and excitement.



Bev's work has been accepted into recent CWA National Exhibitions, including this most recent one. Here is her painting appearing in the 46th National Exhibition as well as one from the 44th.

Bev's painting *Lace and Grace* will be part of the 2016 Transparent Watercolor Society of Americas 40th Annual Exhibition.

Our workshop, *Painting Life with Life*, is intended to be a "think outside the box" class - life as in people and animals, and life as in energy and excitement. Bev offers a no-nonsense approach to help students of all levels to master technique, design and color. strong values, with emphasis on painting people and animals. She will discuss what materials work best, the do's and don'ts of watercolor, facial features and skin tones, as well as good grays, vibrant colors, rich blacks, and varying the colors within your subject. Even though figures are her love, there is also time spent on animals, and still lifes. All levels welcome in this class: CWA members, \$395, Non-Members \$450. Jozwiak also blogs at <http://tiny.cc/xg7d9x> In a recent column, Bev addressed the issue of how to do skin tones. Here are excerpts from her answer to this the very common question.



Question: Mixing skin tones in watercolor is difficult. Do you have any suggestions on how to mix beautiful skin tones and not end up with muddy colors?

Answer: There are a multitude of great painting combinations for good skin tones. Most good ones are basically a combination of red, yellow and blue. Make a skin chart of your own by placing each color with very little mixing. Mix slightly (and with a little more water) in the center. This will give you more skin tones to choose from, as each combination will be different depending on the amount of red, yellow, or blue that is used, and by the amount of water.



One of my favorite dark skin tone combinations is a mixture of burnt sienna, cadmium red, and French Ultramarine Blue. Just remember though, that even when the figure has dark skin, on the light side of the face, you can move into a light skin tone mixture, and still leave areas that are the untouched white paper.

I generally cool down the face with blues, but here in *Feathers and Flowers* I used a Sap Green, Yellow Ochre, Burnt Sienna and French Ultramarine combo, along with Cadmium Red. I had used green in the leaves around the flowers, so it felt appropriate to use it in her skin too. I let it run into her hair, to tie the whole painting together. Even though I list all the colors I use, in some places two may be used, in others three and even one as a stand-alone color.



For lighter skin tones, I tend to use Cadmium Red and Yellow Ochre for the first wash and Manganese Blue Hue as a wash over the top after the initial skin tone has slightly dried. Blues help areas to recede so they work well at the temple, under the lip, and to connect the eyebrow to the corner of the eye. The Reds make things come forward, so they work well on the tip of the nose, cheeks, and ears.

Just remember that the amount of water used will make a huge difference in the appearance of your skin tone. It can go very light or quite dark. Although Cadmium Red is a very strong color don't be afraid to use it at almost full strength in certain areas


Per Bev, other keys to making skin tones work include leaving the whites of the paper, and using the paint thickly in some areas and lots of water in others. "If it's not pretty on the palette, it's not pretty on the paper."

"Creativity is allowing yourself to make mistakes. Art is knowing which ones to keep." – Scott Adams

This quote was brought to my attention recently and of course this started my mind whirling!

Are there really any "mistakes" in art? Sure, maybe the colors chosen weren't quite what you wanted, but is that a "mistake"? Maybe that line wasn't straight enough, or curvy enough, but is that a "mistake"? Maybe it was too humid to attempt painting, or hot, or cold, but is that a "mistake"? Maybe the paper was too rough for the subject matter, or too smooth, but is that a "mistake"? Maybe the subject matter was too big to capture, or too small, but is that a "mistake"?

Who says what a "mistake" is? Merriam-Webster Dictionary/Thesaurus defines a mistake as: A wrong judgment. An unintentional departure from truth or accuracy. **Synonyms and Related Words:** Blunder, bobble, boo-boo, clinker, error, fault, flub, foul-up, fumble, goof, inaccuracy, lapse, misapprehension, miscalculation, misconception, misconstruction, misconstruing miscue, misinterpretation, misjudging, misjudgment, misstatement, misstep, muff, slip, slipup, stumble to name a few.

What?! With all this weight on our shoulders not to make "mistakes" how can anyone create anything? Maybe we should stop trying not to make "mistakes" and create art our own way. My vision isn't yours, your vision isn't mine. Maybe I want my subject smack dab in the middle of the painting!

Maybe we should just look beyond the "mistakes" and accept the art for itself. Does it inspire? Does it make us feel good? Do we like the colors? Does it make us question? Does it represent what we wanted to represent?

One of my favorite impressionists, Renoir, commented on several of these thoughts.

"I've spent my life making blunders." "Regularity, order, desire for perfection destroy art. Irregularity is the basis of all art." "You don't talk about paintings, you look at them."


Maybe we should start painting for ourselves and see where that takes us.

Watercolor Painting with Misuk at Vacaville Art Gallery

A 4-week class, "Watercolor Painting with Misuk" will begin on March 3 and will meet on Thursdays through March 24. The class will be held from 10:00am until 12:30pm at the Vacaville Art Gallery Annex, 718 E. Monte Vista Ave, Vacaville. We will concentrate on how to complete a painting that reflects both your inspiration and artistic expression. Every week, the class will take on a new project to complete using either your own references or my demo references. We will use subjects for portrait/figure painting, still life, and landscape/cityscape painting. These classes will be somewhat structured and geared toward learning/refreshing the elements and principles of watercolor. Thus, it will be a good opportunity for people who consider themselves beginner or intermediate painters. Each class will begin with a 5-10 minute lecture, followed by a 30-45 minute demo and one hour of painting. I will work with each individual while you are painting. For the final 30 minutes, we will have a thorough critique session. I believe in critiques because over the years I have learned so much from my instructor's and fellow artist's comments. The tuition for the class is \$60 for 4 weeks.




