January Guest Artist – David Savellano, MCWA The Art of Travel



Kick start your New Year's resolution to create more art and devote more time to your artistic endeavors by attending "The Art of Travel" presentation by featured artist, David Savellano at the January General meeting. This demonstration is lively, interactive and where audience participation is highly encouraged. So bring your paper, paints and brushes. Come early, a limited number of tables will be set up and made available on a first come first serve basis.

You will be able to sketch along with David, as he demonstrates rapid sketching and painting techniques to use during your next travel adventure. Bring a permanent black ink pen, paints and watercolor sketchbook or paper and a round brush size 6 or 8.



David will share tips about the essential sketching and painting tools you will need for travel sketching. Sketching allows you to capture your initial impression that are sometimes more memorable than if you took hundreds of photographs. These sketching "gems" are suitable for framing or can be the source of inspiration for your next larger painting. David will also share his famous "Dot-Smash-Legs" technique for adding figures to your sketches and paintings.

Where Can We Create Art?

My mind has dwelled on the Ghost Ship warehouse tragedy since it happened December 2, 2016. Thirty-six individuals lost their lives to the fire that consumed the warehouse. The warehouse was filled with art and artists. It was filled with ideas. It was filled with hope. It was filled with life, love, laughter, dance, words and much, much more. It was filled with supplies. How sad is it when people cannot afford a safe place to live AND a safe place to create.

Many of us worked regular, well-paid jobs and squeezed in art when we found time. Many of us can now create art full time because we have retired from jobs that pay us pensions. Many people in today's economy do not have that same luxury.

As more information came to light about the Ghost Ship, it made me think of La Ruche in Paris. Why? La Ruche was an artist's residence in Paris. La Ruche means "the beehive." The three-story building was created for the 1900 Exposition as a temporary wine rotunda. After the Expo it was dismantled, moved and reconstructed as an artist colony. Up to 200 artists worked and lived there at a time. The building was ramshackle with very few amenities. The rent was dirt-cheap.

"At one time or another in those early years of the 20th century, Guillaume Apollinaire, Alexander Archipenko, Joseph Csaky, Gustave Miklos, Alexandre Altmann, Ossip Zadkine, Moise Kisling, Marc Chagall, Max Pechstein, Nina Hamnett, Fernand Léger, Jacques Lipchitz, Pinchus Kremegne, Max Jacob, Blaise Cendrars, Chaim Soutine, Robert Delaunay, Amedeo Modigliani, Constantin Brâncuși, Amshey Nurenberg, Diego Rivera, Marevna, Luigi Guardigli, Michel Sima, Marek Szwarc and others, called the place home or frequented it." (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/La_Ruche)
Would these artists have been able to reach the heights of success if they did not have a place to live and work at a reasonable price?

My thoughts, after the Ghost Ship disaster, moved on to; what ...?
What would these artists have created if the fire did not happen?
What did the world lose?
What if the artists had been able to reside and work in a safe building?
And La Roche?
Looking at a tiny list above of some of the artists that lived and worked at "the beehive" we know what the world would have lost.
It makes me think...

A Cautionary Tale

At November's general meeting there was a question about what type of reference photos could be used to paint from, especially if you were interested in entering an exhibition. I have a personal nightmare to share with you.


Last spring I was very excited to be accepted into Northwest Watercolor Society's National Exhibition. To add to the excitement their director phoned to tell me that I had won an award! She asked what had been my inspiration. I related my entire story to her. I had seen the photo on a public source, loved it and went about finding the photographer to ask his permission to paint it. He was thrilled to say yes! It's a very cool photo of people behind a screen. There were tons of gray values and it was a challenge to paint.

So back to Northwest and the phone call. As soon as I hung up, it wasn't 60 seconds later when the phone rang again. The very same director phoned to tell me that not only had I lost the award, but the painting had been disqualified. She was very kind but you can only imagine how mortified and embarrassed I felt. It's taken me this long to be able to share my story!

Please take an important lesson from my cautionary tale. DO NOT ENTER ANY SHOW, National or local, USING A PHOTOGRAPH THAT IS NOT YOUR OWN. It can be worded in many different ways, but "wholly your own" means just that. Photo references taken from an online source, publications, your friends or family should only be used for your personal challenges and enjoyment, nothing else.

I now spend almost as much time taking good photos as I do painting. Lesson learned.

Looking at Paintings with Charles Demuth

This column is a short story about Charles Demuth an American watercolor painter (1883-1935), who lived and worked in the early 20th century when everything was changing so rapidly. Many art historians regard Demuth as one of the most influential watercolor artists because of the inventiveness and beauty of his work.

Demuth was born and lived most of his life in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. He traveled frequently to New York and Provincetown, both active centers of

the arts at the time (and today). Demuth also frequently traveled to Europe and Paris, where the cubists influenced him.

Demuth was friendly with artists and writers in New York and Provincetown including Eugene O'Neill, Gertrude Stein, Georgia O'Keeffe and others. Modern art, or art for art's sake, was emerging with tremendous energy during his lifetime. Demuth was part of the modernist movement and was identified as a precisionist, as was Georgia O'Keeffe.




Red Chimneys by Charles Demuth: Watercolor and Graphite on paper, 1918

In Red Chimneys, I see the style that was named "precisionist." The painter could convey many perspectives though. Look at the looseness in the next image of a dancer.

Provincetown, located at the tip of Cape Cod, is built around the bay that Demuth painted here. At the time, Provincetown was a favored spot for artists and writers looking for a respite from New York during the hot summer months. Demuth used colors that reminded some viewers of Fauvists or the "wild beasts" of color. In contrast, the structure of the painting remains formal though.

Demuth visited New York and Provincetown frequently. In the scene below, Marcel Duchamp, Edward Fisk and Marsden Hartley were portrayed sitting in the jazz bar of the Marshall Hotel. Many artists in this circle exhibited their work at the Alfred Stieglitz gallery.

The portrait to the left may be of Russian composer, Igor Stravinsky. While on a visit to Paris, Demuth attended a performance of The Rite of Spring, where the audience rioted in reaction to the innovative musical structure.

Although not watercolor, I included the Figure 5 as the painting is one of Demuth's most famous. The painting is based on a poem by his friend William Carlos Williams, who saw a red fire truck moving rapidly down a rainy New York street. The diminishing size of number 5 indicates the receding motion and the slanting lines are rain. After his death, Demuth left his paintings to Georgia O'Keeffe, who made important decisions about the museums that would house his work.

Art experts believe that Pink Tulips was painted around 1930. However, this painting was found on the easel in Demuth's studio after his death in 1935. Charles Demuth produced over 900 paintings during his lifetime. Demuth lived in an exciting time and traveled in highly creative circles. He died at age 51 from the effects of Diabetes.

I want to close this story with a quote from Demuth, "Paintings must be looked at and looked at and looked at... no writing, no talking, no singing, no dancing will explain them." Dear reader, I enjoyed learning about Demuth and I hope you did also. As always, I am interested in your thoughts and comments.
