“If a painting is worth a thousand words, then let me share my novel with you.”

This beautiful quote from Birgit probably encapsulates why we have invited Birgit for a return visit to CWA, after her successful 2013 CWA workshop and General Meeting guest artist appearance. Once again, Birgit O'Connor will be demonstrating her techniques for creating dramatic and stunning floral paintings. While she is best known for them, Birgit also paints wonderfully atmospheric landscapes, as well as beautiful rocks, sand and sea glass. “Everything has a voice that not everyone can hear; the form is the language, the content the voice...”

O'Connor is a self-taught artist who honed her skills while also a full-time wife and mother (many of us can appreciate those challenges). She finds great inspiration in the beauty near her home in Bolinas, California. A Signature Member of CWA, Birgit is also a member of Northern California Chapter of the Women's Caucus of Art, Marin Art Council, Bolinas Living Artists, and the Louisiana Watercolor Society. Birgit has also been chosen for *Who's Who in America*, and *Who's Who in American Women*.

Australian Artist and International Artist Magazine are among the 30 national and international publications that have featured her award-winning work. Others include *Watercolor Magic*, *Artist Sketch*, *Watercolor Basics*, and *The Artist's Magazine*. Additionally, she has been featured in articles in *The San Francisco Chronicle*, *Marin IJ*, *Pt. Reyes Light*, the *New York Times*, *Dobry Zank* (Poland), and *L'Art de l'Aquarelle* (France).

O'Connor is someone who has really embraced the web and the new media. Her website even has own online streaming video workshops, and she has also given online workshops for the Artist Network University. Birgit has authored two of her own books, *Watercolor Essentials* and *Watercolor in Motion*, through North Light Books, has been included in several other books. *Watercolor in Motion* has been translated into Hebrew and is now even available in Chinese. She is currently working on her third book, scheduled to be released in 2017. Birgit's DVDs cover not only flowers, but she also has a DVD entitled *Waves, Water & Clouds*, and another called *Atmospheric Landscapes*.

Birgit's most recent awards include 2nd Place Award at the 44th International Watercolor Exhibition, in New Orleans for the Louisiana Watercolor Society (2014) and previously the Sailis International Award

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in New Orleans for her florals. She has shown her work all over the world, including a one-woman show in Hong Kong.

Regarding florals, Birgit says, “Each of us has the choice of simply seeing a flower or something much more. I am intrigued by the character I find in plants, something most would find unusual in such a traditionally passive subject. I love to take a flower and enhance its drama, which can allow you to view it in a completely different way. A small and delicate blossom, which would normally be unnoticed, can become intimidating or evoke an incredibly passionate response... Fascinated with depth, shadow and movement, I found that the watercolor medium gave me a feeling of working with subconscious emotion, that the flower itself became a vehicle for color and form.”

In her 20 years of painting, Birgit clearly has mastered glazing and color blending on paper, achieving seamless color shifts and multiple depths without any detectable transition lines where she doesn't want them. Given that she often works on large paintings, this is an impressive skill, and one which she will be transmitting to her workshop students.



Feed Your Own Creativity

“There are no rules. That is how art is born, how breakthroughs happen. Go against the rules or ignore the rules. That is what invention is about.” - Helen Frankenthaler

I speak with artists all the time regarding composition, color, perspective, products (paper, canvas, paint, etc.). I read articles, books and magazines. I watch DVDs, online videos and TV shows. I watch live artist demonstrations and attend workshops. What am I getting at with all of this?

Let it go!

Your art will NEVER please everyone.

Your art is YOUR art.

Guidelines and suggestions are good; however when they STOP your personal creativity, step away. No! Run away!

For “art” to progress, artists must be “allowed to create,” not just mimic other work. We would be “stuck” in an art movement and never move on or up or sideways. I looked up the term Art Movement online.

See the list provided on Wikipedia:

There are 28 art movements listed under ‘A’ alone. “These terms, helpful for curricula or anthologies, evolved over time to group artists who are often loosely related. Some of these movements were defined by the members themselves, while other terms emerged decades or centuries after the periods in question.”

Don’t label what you do, just do.



Fun in the Sun Tahoe Style


Activity at our CWA Outreach Program for Veterans at the Martinez Outpatient Clinic includes our completed Tahoe Project, participation in the CCC Arts & Culture Commission, AC5 About Face Program, and preparation to create watercolor self-portraits in the summer months. The self-portraits will be shown in the Veteran's Day Event, October 11, 2017, at the CCC Administration Building, 651 Pine Street, Martinez, as well as a traveling library show in Contra Costa County as a part of AC5's program.

In the fall I was approached by Gary Agcaoli, Martinez VA Recreation Therapy Department, who invited us to create three art works for the Dementia & Memory Care patients in the Tahoe Wing. The underlying intent of the images is to reflect in the works the Lake Tahoe Area as a Way Finding map for patients to find their way back to their wing. The Twenty-Year Anniversary of the opening of the building was on April 5th. Attached are photos of the art pieces.

"Fun in the Sun Tahoe Style," 48 x 44 inches, watercolor on masonite board. Masonite was used to accommodate the size. It was totally experimental and we learned a lot about the process. The painting is a collaboration done by both inpatients and outpatients. The artists expressed images of fun experiences they had in Tahoe and each took a section to create the mandala.

"My art is based on the figurative genre. Observing everyday encounters, events and endeavors, I find insights into how I want to portray the people I draw and paint. While figures are the constant, what changes is the degree of realism or abstraction I'll use as I play with the design, or play with the paint. Much of my recent work has been on a large format with a plethora of figures in invented settings. The process of creating the scene, involves finding opportunities to capture movement for the characters and what they are doing, but also to create animated surfaces of one kind or another. If I'm working with a single figure not in motion, I'll want that character to be important to a larger sphere of pending activity. While working on a piece, I become involved in the moments happening among the inhabitants of the canvas, and in the end, hope the viewer will also become engaged."

The Artist's point of view: "My concerns as an artist have always been rather straight forward. The discipline of direct painting, both in the plein air experience and in the studio, has helped me to develop a loose handling of paint that speaks as much about the paint itself as it does any given subject matter. I try to combine traditional methods of painting with a 'sense of myself living in the present.' My paintings are a direct response from the world around me as I strive to be 'in the moment' while I work. Nature has proven to be the most demanding and inspiring teacher... so I work from life, as often as possible and try to remain open to new ideas and new approaches. Each painting is a simple sentence in an ongoing story, the tale is a compilation of images that reflect the magic of life itself and the mysteries of light, color, and shape as I respond to the world around me. Painting has enabled me to be more observant and appreciative of the beauty and richness in everyday life."

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Venue

The Lindsay Dirx Brown Gallery is located at 12501 Alcosta Blvd., San Ramon, California. This Gallery is large, vertically open, well-lit and offers many options for display.

Eligibility

The CWA Members Show is open to all CWA artists 18 years or older. Paintings must be two-dimensional and primarily watermedia on paper surface; Yupo and Tyvek are acceptable. Pastel or collage may be used as long as watermedia is the dominant element. No digital media, photography, prints, or reproductions. Source material and composition must be wholly original and not derived from any published images. Entries must be recent work completed within the last two years, entirely the work of the artist, and not shown previously in a CWA Member Show. No workshop or class work allowed. All paintings must be for sale.

Size Limits

Minimum image: 140 square inches, no side less than 10 inches. Maximum outside frame: 40" x 40".

Framing

All paintings must be framed in simple, square-cornered frames ready for hanging and protected under Plexiglas with foam core backing, wire ends taped and ready to hang. **No sawtooths, clamps or eye screws.** Mats (optional) must be white or off-white. Colored liner mats are acceptable. Additional details may include instructions to accepted artists.

Online Entries Only

All entries will be submitted via our website, www.californiawatercolor.org. Artists may enter up to three digital images in jpeg format, resolution 300 dpi, with 1200 pixels on the longest side, one painting per file. **Show only the image without mat or frame.**

CWA Members: Log in to the Members Home page, choose Shows/Exhibitions>, California Shows, confirm your information, and then add your painting details and upload your images.

Entry Fees (non-refundable)

Entry fee is payable on PayPal by credit, debit, or individual account. CWA members: \$20 up to two images, \$30 for a maximum of three images.

Accepted Entries

All accepted artists will be notified by email and results will be posted online May 18, 2017. Accepted work must match submitted image; paintings not consistent with submitted image may be disqualified. **All paintings must have labels for painting mounted on the back.** Labels are found on Californiawatercolor.org >Membership >Forms > Labels for paintings.

Sales

All sales will be handled by the artist. Lindsay Dirx Brown Gallery will retain a 20% commission, and CWA will retain a 10% commission.

Conditions and Liabilities

No work may be withdrawn before the end of the Show. CWA and the Lindsay Dirx Brown Gallery reserve the right to photograph artwork or copy images for promotional purposes. Insurance coverage is the artist's sole responsibility, both in transit and during the Show. Neither CWA nor the Lindsay Dirx Brown Gallery insures the artwork and neither shall be responsible for loss or damage to any artwork submitted. The submission of entries to this Show shall constitute an agreement on the part of the artist to the terms and conditions as set forth in this prospectus.

Fun Facts & Historical Musings, Part III

While the 1970s was the decade of creation, the 1980s was the decade of growing pains for Eastbay Watercolor Society. EWS was fortunate to have a strong set of by-laws that provided a constant structure for addressing the many issues facing the organization. Membership grew from a high of 32 in the 1970s to 260 in the 1980s. Establishing themselves as a respected art association in the Bay Area, more members meant more options and opportunities for Eastbay Watercolor Society artists. To attract new members, the EWS Board of Directors juggled lots of brushes and sometimes had to do several preliminary sketches as they painted their way forward.

The one constant that kept EWS in the frame and remains constant today were the carefully structured EWS by-laws. The board often referred questions to lawyer and watercolor patron, Henry Hardy, when resolving a problem presented for the benefit of the membership.

Among the many challenges of the 1980s was how to cope with the technological advances beginning to surface throughout society. In the early 1980s the recording secretary did everything by hand. Reading through the minutes it almost seems like a secretarial requirement was good penmanship. Around 1985 the minutes begin to appear as typed documents, a definite time saver.

Along with efficiency in minute recording, the Board explored easier ways to send out newsletters to members. Bulk mailing was tried as an alternative to the arduous task of addressing and mailing individual newsletters each month. Initially it appeared that bulk mailing was not cost effective and newsletters returned to the original method. Finally toward the end of the 1980s bulk mailing efficiency improved and another problem was solved.

As membership grew, the location of monthly meetings was a continuing problem. The January 1986 newsletter announced: "the equation of easy access + price + availability resulted in the decision to move our monthly general meetings to Masonic Hall, 9 Altarinda Road, Orinda, on the third Thursday of the month (the only date available)" (sic). Former meetings were held in the Pleasant Hill Community Center and San Francisco Savings and Loan in Walnut Creek.

Workshop fees and locations fluctuated during this time. Fees to members varied dependent on location, size of room, number of days and prestige of invited artist. All these issues were difficult to manage because a workshop director was not a Board member and therefore needed support and final approval from a board member to sign off on contracts and approve proposed arrangements. This problem caused a lot of redundancy and sometimes unfortunate delays and miscommunications. By the second half of the 1980s it was clear that the Workshop Director was an important board position and was made official in 1986.

In 1985 Rex Brandt and Joan Irving presented a workshop at Holy Names College. After much discussion the fee for this workshop was set at \$110. Charlotte Huntley and her committee (Charlotte Britton, Barbara Gilson and Helen Laitner) worked hard to put on a first class workshop. Charlotte, and husband Neal, went the extra mile opening their home to Brandt and Irving to use during their stay. An evening presentation for a fee of \$10.00 was offered to members. Brandt also juried the entries for the upcoming National Exhibition. It was a very busy week in EWS history!


Another topic that emerged during the 1980s was whether or not the name Eastbay Watercolor Society was significant to represent the growing organization. The subject of name change was presented in newsletters and members opinions were solicited. Of course, everyone had one. It was argued that the "East Bay Watercolor Society" was too exclusive, indicating it was an organization open only to enthusiasts within the parameters of the East Bay. Others felt EWS was enough and suited them just fine. This discussion ebbed and flowed throughout the 1980s and closed the decade unresolved.

Without a strong structure of bylaws, few guidelines would have existed to help EWS directors survive the difficult problems presented to a growing organization.

Next month find out how the Eastbay Watercolor Society became known as the California Watercolor Association.

Art of Place: Nita Engle

Now in her early nineties, Nita Engle is an accomplished watercolor artist, who lives far north on the south shore of Lake Superior in the upper peninsula of Michigan. Lake Superior has shorelines in three states and Canada. National Geographic regards the northern boundary waters between the US and Canada as one of the most beautiful regions in the world. Nita has a ringside seat to this lovely part of the world and many of her paintings are of the region.

Engle was born and grew up in Michigan. She attended Northern Michigan University and spent four years studying at the Art Institute of Chicago. She was an Art Director for an advertising agency while in Chicago during the 1940s (a time when few women had such positions).



Nita has been an active member of American Watercolor Society (AWS) since 1969, winning many awards at AWS exhibits. Her work was shown in other prestigious exhibits both nationally and internationally. One of her paintings is owned by the US State Department in a collection, which represents American art in selected embassies.

Although Michigan is her home, Engle has painted landscapes from scenes all over the world. Still, I find special qualities in the paintings of Michigan and the north. I think of Nita as a painter of place and Michigan is her place.

The island referenced in the painting above is most likely Mackinac (pronounced Mackinaw) Island, a place I visited many times. Mackinac is a small island, located in the Straits of Mackinac, where cars are not allowed. Horses, horse drawn carriages, and walking are the forms of transport. Travelers reach the island by ferry in the summer. In the winter, the water freezes and natives can walk to the mainland over the ice. Few tourists are around to walk the ice at that time of year. The air is fresh and clear, the woods are magical, and summer is very brief.

Nita no longer teaches, but I did find a YouTube clip of her earlier demonstrations. I was fascinated by the looseness of her technique. I also hunted around and found the finished painting that she starts in this video clip. I think the DVDs are still available online. I strongly recommend visiting the YouTube clip, which is only seven minutes long.


