The Drawing Board

California Watercolor Association

Each month, a different member of the CWA Board of Directors will have the opportunity to write an art-related article for our members.

Science is our friend and benefactor!

For my turn to write 'the drawing board' article, I thought that we could look into some of the many connections between science and the arts...specifically in our case, color in the Industrial Revolution.

Historically, the search for new colors was focused on finding new colors (dyes) for fabric and for paints. Among others, the textile industry grew rapidly as the Industrial Revolution made possible the mass production of fabrics and clothing for a burgeoning population. Paint to protect and decorate buildings and other things were also the focus of finding new colors. Artist's paints benefited from these advancements, but were lower priorities than society's other needs.

During the Industrial Revolution, scientific advancement more than tripled the number of elements in (what became) the Periodic Table. Some elements, such as iron, copper, silver, lead, tin, gold and mercury were known since before antiquity.

From that time to just before the beginning of the Industrial Revolution in 1760, there were only 14 (what became designated as) 'elements' known to humankind. By the end of that period of discoveries (around 1840), there were 55, many of which were able to be used to create new colors, among other things.

So, while this search to find new colors had a focus, we'll see that some new colors


were discovered by happy accidents, the result of scientific research with completely different goals in mind. One story among many is that of William Perkin, a student at the Royal College of Chemistry, he was attempting to invent an anti-malaria drug in a makeshift lab at his home. He noticed that a liquid developed in his experiments stained a cotton rag

a beautiful intense mauve color. Realizing its value, Perkin quickly abandoned his original experiment and his studies to commercialize his new color discovery. Not long afterwards, Queen Victoria wore a dress the color of Perkin's mauve to her daughter's wedding causing quite a fashion sensation. The new color became known as Queen's Lilac.



In another such story, a Swiss paint maker working in Berlin, Johann Diesbach, was attempting to make a new red color using Cochineal insects, something that had been used to make red dye since the time of the Aztecs. Herr Diesbach used some potash in his experiment, unaware that it was

tainted...and a new color was born, Prussian Blue! These are just two examples of how many of the colors we use have come into being by happy accidents.

Some other vivid colors that came along during the Industrial Revolution included Cobalt Blue in 1807, Viridian (green) in 1838, Cadmium Yellow in 1820, Cerulean Blue and Cobalt Violet, in 1860 as well as a synthetic version of Ultramarine Blue that was very much less expensive than the organic version. Emerald Green appeared around this time, although its toxicity

led to its pretty quick demise. Once it was discovered that the same chemical in Emerald Green paint was used as rat poison in the sewers of Paris, people lost their enthusiasm for the color! In fact, there is speculation that the emerald green flocked wallpaper in a favorite room of Napoleon's where he was exiled, may have contributed to his death!

Another aspect of the immense changes brought during the Industrial Revolution was that as the dye and pigment industry grew, scientists began to develop ways to chemically synthesize pigments that had traditionally been made from natural materials. A well known story is that of Ultramarine Blue.

Lapis Lazuli is a semi-precious stone that, for centuries was found only in remote parts of the world, principally Afghanistan. It has been mined there





since antiquity and was highly valued for its intense blue color. During the Middle Ages, it began to be imported to Europe where it was ground into powder to produce the finest and most expensive of all blue pigments, 'ultramarine' from the Latin 'beyond the sea'. It was at times more expensive than gold



and was reserved for the most holy parts of paintings in the Middle Ages and Renaissance, the robes of Christ or the Virgin Mary, for example. In 1824, a French organization to promote industry created a contest with a six thousand franc prize to the first one who could create an accurate, synthesized version of Ultramarine Blue. A German and a Frenchman stepped forward with their results at the same time. After a bitter squabble

about who was first, the organization awarded the prize to the Frenchman and the color then became known as French Ultramarine Blue. [An aside, in our current watercolors the difference between a tube of Ultramarine Blue and French Ultramarine Blue is that the latter is much more granulating.]

The discoveries in science have yielded many new colors for all manner of uses, certainly the art world's as well.

Another interesting story where science, invention and the arts overlapped, in 1841, John Goffe Rand, an American, invented something that would help turn artists' attention even more towards nature and the outdoors. The collapsible metal tube could hold paint (among other things) and allow for much easier opportunities to paint 'en plein air' as well as in studio. Prior to the invention of the metal tube, paint was prepared for artists by a guild of craftsmen called Colourmen. Most artists worked with a preferred colourman and would place their orders, which, when ground and prepared were delivered in a pig's bladder tied shut with a string. The

artist would pierce the bladder and squeeze out what they needed. The metal tube changed that (likely to the great relief of pigs!). Some art historians argue that the invention of the metal tube and the explosion of the vibrant new colors for artists during the Industrial Revolution along with another new technology, the locomotive were responsible for the advent of the Impressionist movement. Artists in Paris and elsewhere could simply pack up their tubes and hop on a train and get out in the country to paint for the day...and they did.

These are just a very few of the fascinating stories about color and how we've gotten the paintbox that we have today. Art and science have had wonderful connections over the centuries... thank you science!






