Experimental Art and Working on Yupo by Georganne Zaro, MCWA



What is Experimental Art?

Experimental art is about breaking the rules with purpose. It embraces risk-

taking, curiosity, and innovation. It celebrates the process exploring new ideas, techniques, and materials, often outside traditional boundaries. It's the art of discovery, where unfamiliarity is part of the magic. In short: push boundaries, explore possibilities, and embrace the unexpected.


Many years ago, I took a watercolor class at DVC with Jade Fon Woo. I watched in awe as he reverently glided his paintbrush across the paper—simple, yet graceful strokes that somehow transformed into amazing paintings. Around the same time, I attended a workshop with the watercolorist Don Osterloh. I was captivated by how painting a full-sheet watercolor created a masterpiece in about an hour using nothing but a 2-inch flat brush.

Then came the workshop that changed my whole conception of artistic expression. Maxine Masterfield, a legend in experimental art, led a session at Asilomar in Monterey, CA. Her freedom of expression, and the way she played with watercolor medium, unlocked something in me. I was so excited and stimulated by the process itself. It was how she created such beautiful exciting nonspecific works of art—the process of allowing oneself the freedom to play and explore with abandonment. I was hooked!

Even though I already had a degree in fine art, it wasn't until I encountered three specific artists and their styles that I truly fell in love with watercolor.

A Pause—and a Return

Life, as often happens, got in the way—career, family, and responsibilities took precedence. My paint tubes went silent,



and my brushes stood at attention in their cup—ready, but untouched. The watercolor paper was a blank face, patiently waiting. I continued to attend workshops and painted en plein air amidst my busy schedule, enough to stay connected. But it wasn't until I retired in 2010 that I returned. I was floundering a bit trying to find my voice. Then one day... I met Yupo.

What Is Yupo?

Yupo is a synthetic, non-absorbent paper that makes watercolor behave like it's had one too many cups of coffee. Paint doesn't soak in—it floats, dances, spreads, and blooms. It lets you explore and make wild choices without fear. Why? Because if you hate it, you can just wipe it off and start over! Like a watercolor do-over button. Yupo offers the opportunity to explore more, and take chances, and is very therapeutic. When the paint dries, its unique surface creates interesting textures and effects, resulting in unusual results. Whether painting abstractly or realistically, the painting yields different results than on traditional watercolor paper. Colors can be enhanced, bolder, and more vibrant if desired. Alternatively, the approach can be softer and more muted using different techniques. It's simply enjoyable to embrace unpredictable surprises. It's perfect for experimentation. The surface transforms even simple brush strokes into fascinating patterns. Lifting paint out becomes so easy.

My Wild Yupo Adventures

As I experimented more with different paints on Yupo, I discovered that Daniel Smith's mineral-based watercolors separate and settle in the most delightful, textural way on Yupo paper when dry. One of my favorite colors is Sodalite Genuine—a moody, grainy ink-like blue color with lots of granulation. It behaves like it has a mind of its own. When I



Community Outreach — Oakland Veterans Exploring Granulation and Rust

The vets and CWA volunteers began not in our regular classroom, but in the lounge area. There, Nancy Reddan received a necklace of great affection, designed by Michael Friedland. Each member of the group contributed a signed Valentine's heart along with their wishes for her continued health improvement.

Eventually, we were in the classroom. Each participant received several source photos of a rusty truck, a piece of rough watercolor paper, pencils, erasers, and pigment that was prone to granulation. Watercolor pigments granulate because their particles are denser and larger than those of other pigments. As a result, the particles sit on the surface of the paper, clump, and collect in the pockets of the rough paper giving a less intense color and textured appearance. Some granulating pigments are earth tones, Siennas, and Umbers, as well as Cobalt blue and Aquamarine Blue. Since the pigment particles rest on the surface, it's best to use a flat board without any angle to allow them to settle properly. These pigments are opaque. Once dry they lift easily. When used with a lot of water, they can create a blurry effect in the distance.













Fine particle pigments are more transparent and vibrant, allowing them to sink into the paper more effectively. The mixing of a granular pigment with a fine particle pigment creates a color that shifts. You can create these colors yourself or use Schmincke pigments, as well as Daniel Smith's Lunar Blue and Shadow Violet, among others.

While Sheila was discussing the properties of granulation, the group was drawing their truck. After the initial drawing was complete, she suggested starting with a pink underpainting. Once the underpainting had dried—either naturally or with the help of a hair dryer—we moved on to the next step: creating a granulating test strip using burnt sienna. This would help achieve a rust-like appearance for the truck. Since this process requires time, we decided to work on the painting over two sessions.

We lined up our work along the wall. We saw that there was a wide range of progress. One person painted quite small and finished his work. Another painter painted his own truck which just happened to be the same model as our source photo. His was the most detailed and finished but still needed a background. Everyone finished their drawing and began painting. People liked the project. We look forward to meeting again and continuing our work on granulated rusty trucks.

June Live Meeting & Demo Recap

It was a fun and lively evening at the Lafayette Library with an inspiring demo by award-winning and abstract artist Pat Moseuk. Pat paints intuitively, but she adheres to the principles and elements of design to create her designs. She acknowledges that she began her career painting more realistically but later chose to create abstract works influenced by Diebenkorn and Rauschberger. "There are no mistakes in abstract art, as there is no reference to follow. Only your own vision."

Tonight's demo was a watercolor on paper. Pat admits that she likes geometric designs. Starting with darks, she painted several rectangles using a combination of dark colors and





layering darker colors on top. Gradually, she added lighter colors and splattered paint to the light areas, and a collage was included, gradually developing the painting with bright accents of red and yellow. She added lines and other details with watercolor crayons and pencils.

Pat will be teaching a workshop with CWA next year.

The former ranch of early Walnut Creek pioneer Frank Borges serves as the main location for activities at Walnut Creek's Shell Ridge Open Space. The ranch complex includes a blacksmith shop, several outbuildings, and displays of farm equipment. Additionally, there is a barn and a covered trellis that are available for group reservations. The Borges family home, built in 1901, features historical exhibits from the early 1900s and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

We will meet at 10:00 am in the parking lot of the first picnic area. We will decide on a location for lunch and a critique at 12:30 pm, likely in the shady picnic area. Please remember to park in designated areas; restrooms are available. Be sure to bring water and lunch. Note that the event will be canceled in case of rain.





place another color alongside, such as Royal Blue, Sepia, French Ultramarine, Raw Umber, or some of the iridescent colors, they fight with each other.

At the beginning, I hardly ever use brushes. Instead, I mix my paints to achieve the desired consistency in small pots and squeeze bottles with needle tips. I pour my Sodalite in long lengths, then one of the other colors alongside. Tipping my board, and rocking it, I gently let gravity become my collaborator. For additional texture, I may spritz with water (I don't use salt or alcohol, but they work similarly). As the pigments move, they fight with each other creating blooms, reactions, and textures. As the process begins to dry,

alcohol, but they work similarly). As the pigments move, they fight with each other creating blooms, reactions, and textures. As the process begins to dry, I start to see shapes. My California Coast series started this way. I saw waves, shorelines, distant islands, coves, and storms. I sculpt out of this chaos with flat thin-beveled brushes, and others as needed, working purposely on my composition, eliminating and adding additional paint.





I don't need reference images. I draw from my memories and experience in plein air letting those impressions guide me. I usually work on several paintings at once—right now, six are on my boards. I take my time. Some pieces sit for days, months, or even years until they tell me how to finish them. Alternatively, I can wipe them clean and start over. After all, it's Yupo!

A World of Possibilities

There are so many techniques for working on Yupo—far more than I can include here. Artists are working with Yupo realistically to experimentally create beautiful portraits, florals, landscapes, abstracts, and more.

Curious? Check out YouTube tutorials or find a workshop. Better yet, get yourself a sheet of Yupo, grab some wild colors, and start playing. Let go of perfection. Let the paint do its thing. You never know where it might take you. If you're interested in diving deeper into experimental art, look up the International Society of Experimental Artists (ISEA), co-founded by Maxine Masterfield. It's a treasure trove of inspiration and community.

Now go forth, splash some paint, and let the magic begin.
