Oakland VA - Back to a Basic: Smooth Clean Washes

Our Oakland veterans have been painting with us for a number of years and some fine work has been created. Nevertheless, at their request, we've returned to basics and started with the color wash based on an unfamiliar source.

Kiyoshi Saito was a modern (post-World War II) Japanese woodblock artist whose intriguing work and flat color areas are perfect for practicing washes. Michael Friedland introduced his work to the group showing several examples. One was chosen, which we sketched and then began the color wash work.

Building blocks for washes:

- On the palette make a puddle of water large enough to cover the whole paper area you intend to paint, then mix the color by adding your pigments.
- Place the narrowest drawn wash passage at the top, turning the paper if necessary.
- Angle your paper toward you so gravity will pull your paint down the page.
- Fully load the brush and paint in one stroke across the top.

- Look for the bead at the base of each brushstroke indicating sufficient paint.
- Reload the brush from the paint mixture in the palette and paint again in one stroke overlapping the bead of the stroke above. Repeat till wash area is covered.
- Pick-up extra paint at the bottom of washed area with paper towel or thirsty brush.
- Allow to dry in position.

Some of the group found that they have the habit of returning the brush to the water between brush strokes creating a problem. Others found no bead at the bottom of the stroke indicating that the brush was too small or not fully loaded. Overall, completing Kiyoshi Saito's block print composition in watercolor gave the group excellent practice creating washes. They seem to be persuaded that using their 8" x 9" palettes to puddle the water and then bring in the pigment was a workable system. They accomplished painting some smooth flat even areas of color that made everyone happy and were introduced to the block prints of Kiyoshi Saito.
